LIFE OF FORMER RESIDENT PORTRAYED IN MAGAZINE STORY

"Adventure and a Chinese Proverb" is the title of an interesting article in a recent issue of Peninsula Life, a magazine published in San Francisco, Calif.

The article features the accomplishments of a former resident of Lyons, Mrs. Audrey Shippam, who, with her husband, Col. Willis Shippam, retired officer of United States Army, lives in Burlingame, near San Francisco.

Mrs. Shippam, the former Miss Belle Audrey Forfar, is the daughter of the late James and Ada Mirick Forfar of Lyons. Mr. Forfar was in the lumber business and the family home was in upper William St.

After the family removed to Wisconsin Belle Audrey Forfar made extended visits to her aunt, the late Miss A. Gertrude Mirick of 34 Holley St., now the home of Mrs. Harry Evans.

Mrs. Shippam and her husband have lived at army posts in many parts of the world and she had opportunities to indulge her hobbies of mountain climbing and photography to an unusual degree.

The article states that she braved the hazards of glaciers, snow bridges over crevasses, places where one wrong step meant an avalanche and death, going where no other human being had been.

A life member of the Alpine Club of Canada, she and a friend, Dr. Cora Johnston Best, of Minneapolis, Minn., set records in mountain climbing in many parts of the world. In the Canadian Rockies and in the hinterland of China, they braved dangers and took great risks in photographing the scenes they visited.

Mrs. Shippam always carried her own photographic equipment. Preferring to shoot with a camera rather than with a gun, nevertheless Mrs. Shippam has found her ability to shoot straight a life saver when in country where dwell cougars and bears.

Since Col. Shippam's retirement the brave mountain climber now indulges other interests, including garden sculpture, portrait painting and sketching.

Before going to the Philippines 10 years ago, Mrs. Shippam helped found the Garden Study Club of the Peninsula. After her return, she designed the club's entry in the San Mateo County Garden Club Fiesta. The entry was a prize blue ribbon winner.

Illustrated in the article, the exhibit featured a Chinese garden scene, with stone wall, pool, vines and trees. By the pool is a stone "moon" lantern with crescent moon on its surface. A copper plaque quotes an old Chinese proverb: "Enjoy Yourself. It Is Later Than You Think."

That lantern now has a place of honor in the Shippam garden in a grove of redwoods in Burlingame Hills.

The article is written by Julie Grigg and gives many interesting glimpses of the activities of Mrs. Shippam, who has many friends in this, her old home town, and where Col. and Mrs. Shippam spent some time a few years ago.
